The 30th Native American Film + Video Festival will open Thursday, Mar. 26, 2009, at the Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian in New York, the George Gustav Heye Center. Organized by the museum's Film + Video Center, the festival will close on Sunday, Mar. 29, 2009.

One of the longest running film festivals in North America, the museum celebrates its 14th festival and 30th year with a presentation of more than 60 works that encompass all of the Americas, as well as discussions, parties, and tributes.
